MIECHV Serves Families from Diverse Backgrounds in High-Need Communities in Florida


Florida MIECHV funds local agencies to implement three evidence-based home visiting programs:


Nurse-Family Partnership, Parents as Teachers, and Healthy Families America.


In 2019, MIECHV programs in high-need communities across 30 counties provided more than 35,000 home visits, serving:

2,883 families, including 1,265 pregnant women & **2,423 children**, including 1,759 infants.

Pregnant & Under Age 21	14%








Key Performance Outcomes



of enrolled children had no investigated reports of **abuse** or neglect.




of mothers initiated **breastfeeding**, surpassing the Healthy People 2020 goal of 82%. More than 38% breastfed for six months or longer.



of caregivers reported always using **safe sleep** practices with their infants, compared to 55% national MIECHV average.



of enrolled children received their most recent **well child visit**, compared to 67% national MIECHV average.




of mothers received a **postpartum health visit** from their provider within 8 weeks of giving birth, compared to 67% national MIECHV average.

Screening & Coordination of Services

MIECHV Programs screen children for Developmental issues (A), their caregivers for Depression (B) and Intimate Partner Violence (C), and both for healthy parent-child interactions (D).

In 2019, screening rates surpassed the 85% target.



60% of children identified with a developmental concern received timely supports and services.

96% of caregivers with a positive depression screen were referred and 53% received mental health services.

94% of caregivers with a positive IPV screen were referred to a certified domestic violence center.
