MIECHV Serves Families from Diverse Backgrounds in High-Need Communities in Florida

Florida MIECHV funds local agencies to implement three evidence-based home visiting programs:


Nurse-Family Partnership, Parents as Teachers, and Healthy Families America.


In 2020, MIECHV programs in high-need communities across 29 counties provided more than 37,000 home visits, serving:


2,790 families, including 1,121 pregnant women &

2,445 children, including 1,648 infants.








Key Performance Outcomes




of enrolled children had no investigated reports of **abuse** or neglect.




of mothers initiated **breastfeeding**, and more than 42% breastfed for six months or longer.



of caregivers reported always using **safe sleep** practices with their infants, compared to 70% in 2019.



of enrolled children received their last recommended well child visit based on the American Academy of Pediatrics.




of mothers received a **postpartum health visit** from their provider within 8 weeks of giving birth.

Screening & Coordination of Services

MIECHV Programs screen children for Developmental issues (A), their caregivers for Depression (B) and Intimate Partner Violence (C), and both for healthy parent-child interactions (D).

In 2020, screening rates surpased the 85% target in three out of four categories.



66% of children identified with a developmental concern received timely supports and services.

92% of caregivers with a positive depression screen were referred and 46% received mental health services.

91% of caregivers with a positive IPV screen were referred to a certified domestic violence center.
