MIECHV Serves High-Need Families from Diverse Backgrounds Across Florida

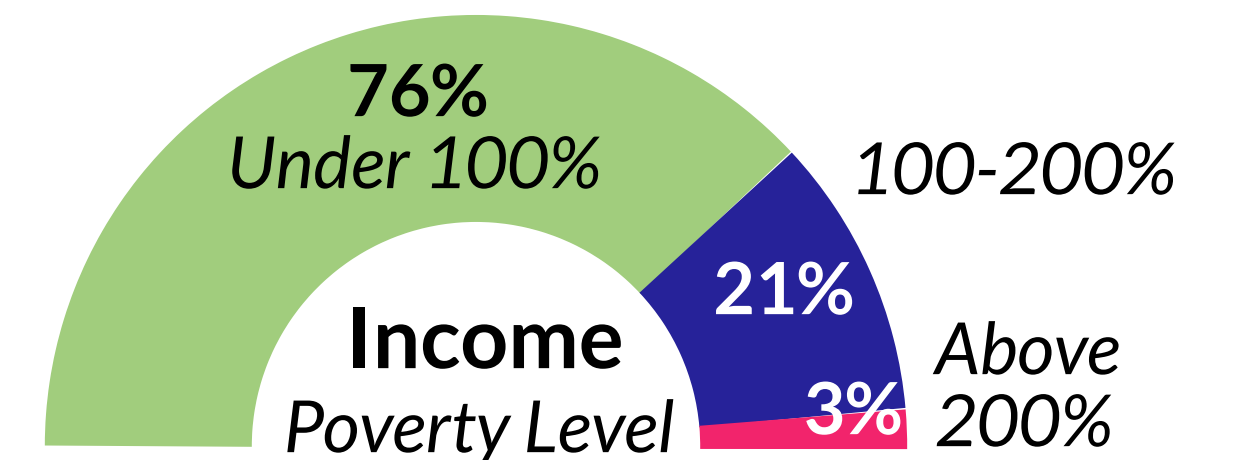
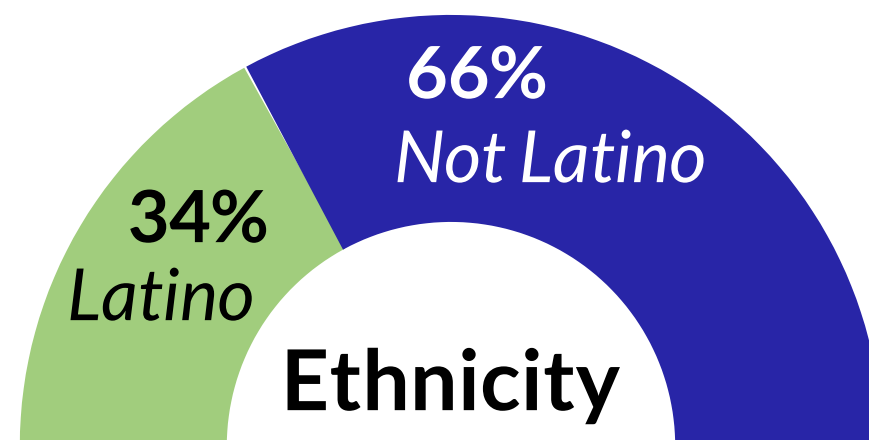
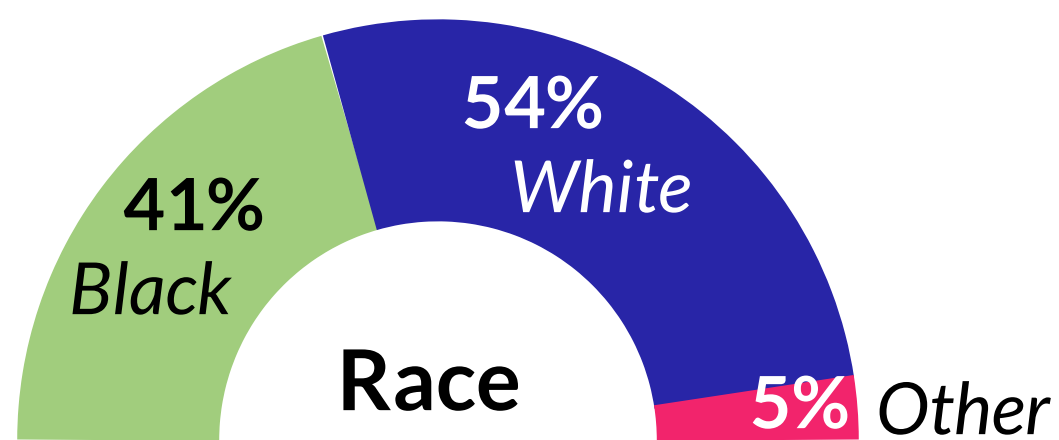
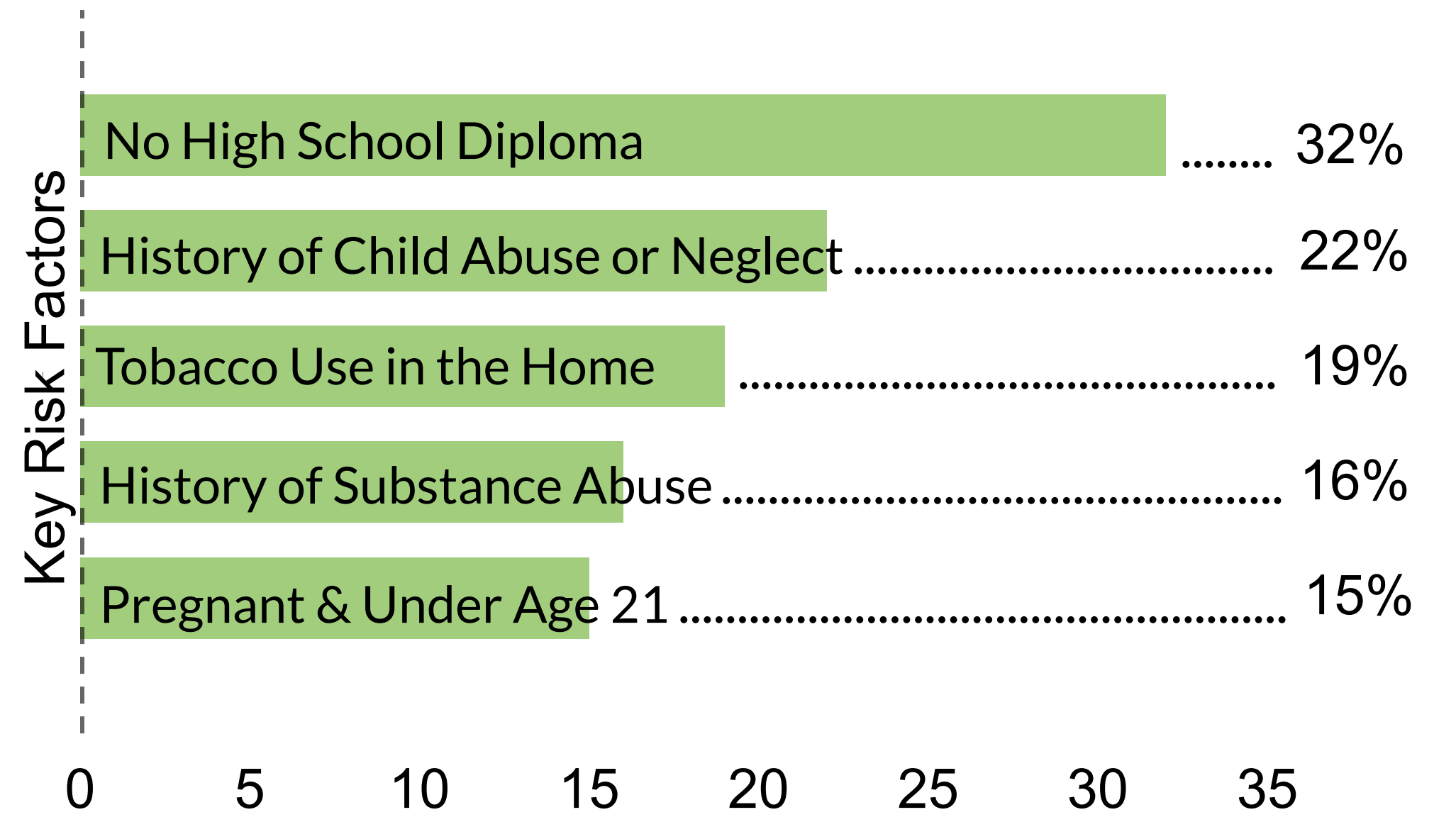
Florida MIECHV funds local agencies to implement three evidence-based home visiting programs:

Nurse-Family Partnership, Parents as Teachers, and Healthy Families America.

In 2018, MIECHV programs in high-need communities across 29 counties provided more than 29,000 home visits, serving:



2,546 families, including 1,086 pregnant women and
2,165 children, including 1,637 infants.



Key Performance Outcomes

10.7% of births were preterm, down from 12.0% in 2017.

88% of mothers initiated breastfeeding, surpassing the Healthy People 2020 goal of 82%. More than 40% breastfed for six months or longer.

96% of enrolled children had no investigated reports of abuse or neglect.

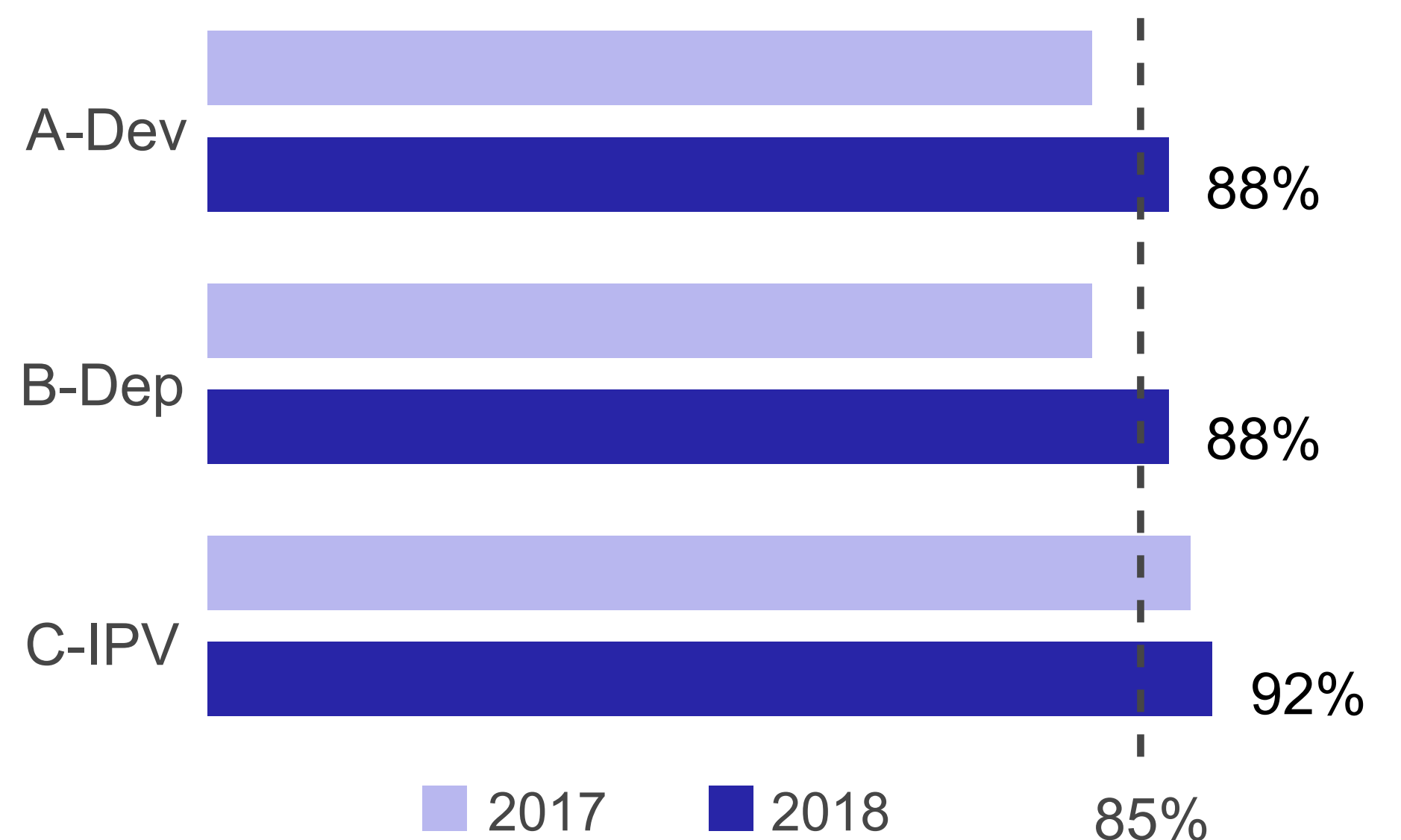
91% of tobacco users were referred to tobacco cessation services soon after enrollment, up from 35% in 2017.

15 of 19 Performance Outcomes Improved from 2017 to 2018

Screening & Coordination of Services

MIECHV Programs screen children for Developmental issues (A) and their caregivers for Depression (B) and Intimate Partner Violence (C).

In 2018, screening rates surpassed the 85% target.



80% of children identified with a developmental concern received timely supports and services.

94% of caregivers with a positive depression screen were referred and 23% received mental health services.

94% of caregivers with a positive IPV screen were referred to a certified domestic violence center.
